SUBJECT: Oil Spill and Final Disposal of the material.

On Friday, May 19, 1978, this office received a telephone call from Mr. Jerry Watkins of Belcher Oil Company. The purpose of this call was to request assistance in determining an environmentally safe location to permanently dispose of the residue of a 6500 gallon oil spill from a ruptured tanker. The accident had occurred at approximately 5:15 p.m.on U.S. 98 of Fort Meade, on May 18, 1978

During conversations with Mr. Watkins, he indicated that the spill had been contained but that rain could wash the oil into the Peace River. I instructed Mr. Watkins to continue organizing to clean up the spill and promised a quick response on where to dispose of the materials.

Upon completing this call I attempted to reach our Hazardous Waste People in Tallahassee and Mr. Frank Wilson, Director of Polk County's landfills. I reached Mr. Wilson who requested that another site rather than the landfills be located. He did agree to accept a small amount of the material if no adequate disposal area were located. I reached Bob Hawfield, Hazardous Waste Specialist, and we agreed that land disposal of the sand impregnated with oil should consist of spreading a six-inch layer and discing it into the top soil. A dike (1 foot) should be maintained and the area undistrubed for a year.

As Harry Kerns and Otis Smith were traveling to this area, I requested their assistance in making a site inspection of the problem. While waiting for their report I continued my conversations with various phosphate companies to locate an adequate disposal area agreeable to all parties. Mr. Jim Carroll of U.S. Agri-Chemicals and Mr. Harold Long of Agrico were very helpful in my endeavor.

Mr. Kerns called the office at noon to report that the problem was being corrected and that the material would be disposed of by dumping it in a slime pond owned by Swift Chemicals and Company. Mr. Kerns was to return to Fort Meade to insure the safety of this operation.

SUBJECT: Oil Spill East of Ft. Meade

On May 19, 1978 the Southwest District Office received notification of an oil spil resulting from the wreckage of a Belcher Oil tanker on U.S. 98, two miles east of Fort Meade. The accident occured at 5:15 p.m. on May 18, 1978 when an oil tanker owned by Belcher Oil Company, heading east, collided with another truck. The tanker ruptured, spilling 6500 gallons of #5 oil on the north side of the road, approximately 200 yards east of the Peace River. The oil was confined in the general area of impact and none reached the river. Belcher personnel were able to recover an estimated 600 gallons the night of the accident by use of a vacuum pick up system.

Otis Smith and Harry Kerns arrived at the scene of the accident at 11:15 a.m., May 19, 1978. A front end loader and a small "bulldozer" was in the process of scraping the oil soaked sand into a pile. Dump trucks were standing by to transport the oil/sand mixture to a disposal site. At that time we were told that Swift Agriculture Chemicals Company had agreed to accept the oil in their slimes settling pond.

At 1:30 p.m., May 19, 1978, Mr. Sharp of Swift arrived and escorted us to an active mining site east of Fort Meade, where he proposed the oil/sand be disposed of on an overburden spoil site. The site was approved by the above mentioned DER representatives and the mixture was spread out over the side of the spoil in such a manner that any runoff would go into the mine cut.

The representative for Belcher said they would replace the oil soaked sand removed from the pasture with new fill material and would replace the fence that was taken out to gain access to the spill area.

# Page 3, section F, subsection 1.

From the population estimated in section G, and based on 3.0 lbs. of solid waste per person per day for the year round residents and 4.0 lbs. for the transients, I feel that 130 to 150 cu. ft. is a reasonable figure. This amount can be handled effectively by the Polk County landfill system.

# Page 3, section F, subsection 2.

This franchise hauler would be required to transport the wastes to a landfill. The mini-dumps are solely for individuals to use, not franchises.
