Jeff – per our discussion earlier, US Foundry is registered as a filter transporter, not just a processor. I checked the recordkeeping requirements, and the transport records do not require signatures. You just need to be able to document the amount of filters being sent to US Foundry or other processors each year for purposes of your annual report.

I will get with you next week regarding the other items we discussed. Have a good time this weekend.

Mike –

The multi sector generic permit (MSGP) for a used oil processing facility is under Sector N. The sectors are assigned according to the Standard Industrial Classification a facility falls under. You would not qualify for a no exposure certificate as you were operating on the 27<sup>th</sup>.
